FROM OUR SEMINARIAN

lessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen."

This is the collect to be read on the Sunday nearest November 16, but it seems more appropriate for this time of year as our fall classes are beginning, both in the schools in our communities and here in Trinity Parish.

The word "learn" or variation of the word is used 16 times in the letters written to congregations and others in the New Testament. Paul and the others who wrote these letters knew the importance of learning about God, not just by scholars, but by all people.

Jesus, who was often called a teacher (in Hebrew: rabbi), told his listeners, "learn from me" (Matthew 11:29.) He also charged his disciples to "proclaim the good news" (Mark 16:15) and to "make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). In other words, to go and teach others what they had learned from Jesus.

Teaching is a calling from God. In the Letter to the Ephesians, it states that "The gifts [God] gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers" (4:11). In writing to the Corinthians, Paul wrote that God had appointed members of the Church as teachers (I Cor. 12:28).


Over the years, we have been blessed here at Trinity by people who have answered a call to teach in various forms. Clergy who have taught both adult and youth classes, catechists who have taught

young children in the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, parents who have been advisors for youth groups, mentors who have led Education for Ministry groups and many other examples. We should recognize and thank these people, as well as consider volunteering to answer the call ourselves.

However, teaching is only part of the equation, because teachers must have those willing to learn. Bishop Kendrick describes us as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement, and the Jesus Movement consists of proclaiming the Good News of Jesus. We cannot proclaim the Good News without learning what that news is.

So, take advantage of the many opportunities to learn. Attend the Adult Forum on Sunday mornings and the Rector's Wednesday morning Bible study. Send your children to one of the atriums or youth classes on Sundays. Take classes. Be informed. And you will be both blessed and a blessing to others. Amen.

MINISTRIES AND FELLOWSHIP

Food Pantry—Every Monday (except holidays) we open our Food Pantry ministry for those in need. These are families or individuals who for whatever reason cannot provide food for their tables. Some are homeless, who need food that does not require cooking. There is always an opportunity for parishioners to donate money or food. In particular, there is a need for bags of rice, 16-ounce cans of fruits and vegetables, 15-ounce cans of spaghetti sauce (not jars) and canned meat (chicken or tuna) for the family bags. The homeless pantry is pretty well stocked, and we have plenty of plastic bags thanks to your help! Your donations continue to keep the Food Pantry doors open.

Hospitality —Trinity is committed to fostering a parish of deep hospitality and fellowship within its walls for all who come to worship the Lord Jesus. Faithful parishioners provide a scrumptious assortment of goodies, coffee, assorted teas and water between the services and following the late service. All are encouraged to participate in providing hospitality and / or joining in these times of fellowship with one another.

Altar Flower Delivery—During most of the year, altar flowers are removed from the church after the 10:30 AM service each Sunday by the Flower Guild and rearranged into two or more arrangements. These flowers are taken by members of the Flower Delivery Committee to parishioners in the hospital or the sick at home, for those celebrating birthdays or anniversaries, or other occasions. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Bible Study — The Rector's Wednesday morning Bible study meets at 11 a.m. each week. The current Bible topic to be discussed is the Gospel of Mark. Fr. Bailey continues to celebrate Holy Eucharist at noon in the chapel following the Bible Study.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd — Catechesis is a wonderful program based on the Montessori method that presents the stories of the Bible and the liturgy of our church in experiential ways. Above all, it also teaches children a sense of discerning the presence of God in everyday life and learning how to understand the sacred mysteries of God all around us. There are two atria – one is for 3K thru kindergarten, the other is for 1st through 5th grades — 9:15 on Sunday mornings. Our Level I atrium (ages 3 through Kindergarten) is in need of a weekly assistant. That group is fairly young this year and we simply need an extra set of hands. It could be sitting with a child that needs one-on-one attention, escorting a child to the restroom, or lighting some candles after a child has set the altar. We are hoping to get enough parishioners signed up so that assistants will be on duty no more than once every two months. DID YOU KNOW?

"Liturgical Colors" in Episcopal worship signify our place in the Church Year:

WHITE, the color of Jesus' burial garments, for Christmas, Easter, and other 'feasts' or festival days, as well as marriages and funerals.

PURPLE/VIOLET for Advent (or ROYAL BLUE) & Lent (or UN-BLEACHED LINEN).

RED is used in Holy Week, the Day of Pentecost, and at ordinations.

GREEN is used during Epiphany and the 'Ordinary Time' after Pentecost Sunday.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD



REFLECTION ON STEWARDSHIP

e are all aware that it is Stewardship Season. I reflect at times on what stewardship means for me as a Christian Benedictine Brother. Surely it means that I am called by God to be a good steward of the gifts He has given me: my home, job, dogs, assets, spiritual life, family, religious community, church... The list of gifts could go on and on. I feel as if the purpose of a gift from God is that I must receive it, but I also must give it away. In a way, we are communicating grace with one another.

In the "Catechism Corner" of this issue of the *Trinity Parish Visitor*, the question is: "What is the ministry of the laity?" The laity are the faithful of the church, who week in and week out are exhorted to "go in peace to love and serve the Lord," and participate in the life of the church. With this in mind, I felt I needed to reflect on what it means to be a lay person with gifts that I must account for and return to God. In my understanding, for all that God has done for me, and continues to do, the very least I can do is give back to Him in ways that only I can give.

One way to give of your talents and gifts is to volunteer. Volunteering is part of the very lifeblood of a parish church. Ninety percent of the programs offered in our parish are volunteer based. Without persons coming together to take care of the bounty we have been given, then the possibility of dissociation from the church inches closer and closer. Without people to help with vital programs and services, we *all* lose. Creativity may become stymied, fellowship may wane, and the care with which is normally given to the church proper and her people begins to slide.

Stewardship is about giving financially, yes, but of our time and talents as well. We are
